OPERATION STRONG

In response to COVID-19, the Pasadena Jaycees partnered with community organizations to distribute hygiene kits in August of 2020 to individuals of lower income with a specific focus on those without housing. Each kit consisted of face masks. hand sanitizing wipes, feminine hygiene products, toothpaste, toothbrush, razor. shampoo, deodorant, socks, hair elastics, body soap, antibiotic ointment. and a card with local resources. We successfully distributed 1.566 kits with 500 allocated to the Los **Angeles Homeless Service** Authority (LAHSA), 300 to Friends in Deed, 300 to Foothill Unity Center, 300 to the Downtown Women's Shelter, and 100 individuals.

Fundraising events included a virtual magic show as well as several individual donations. Special thanks to Arroyo Insurance Services who donated feminine hygiene products and Mrs. Holly of Drinkers Hall of Fame who donated socks.

OPERATION GOBBLER

Last November the Pasadena Jaycees, along with Friends in Deed (FID), distributed Thanksgiving meals to over annual event, cleverly called Operation Gobbler, was first organized in 1987 by Jaycee members Nancy Elchones, Phil Raycraft and honorary life member Jay Rinehart.

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 crisis, Operation Gobbler has looked a little different lately. Unlike previous years, volunteers did not solicit food donations in front of local markets. Instead. the Jaycees procured turkeys for each family through both monetary and food donations.

OTHER THINGS WE DO

Along with our benchmark projects, the Pasadena Jaycees and Pasadena Jaycees Foundation also connect with the community in other ways.

Since 1986, the Pasadena
Jaycees and the Kasukabe
Jaycees of Japan have
participated in an annual
cultural exchange for both
Jaycee members and local high
school students. Each year the
project takes place in either
Kasukabe, Japan, or Pasadena,
California, as a way to foster
international relations and forge
bonds across the globe.

While the project was forced to take a hiatus due to COVID-19. the Pasadena Jaycees Intern Program is also a hugely impactful experience for the community. Approximately 10 to 20 local high school students get the chance to work handin-hand with the Board of Directors to plan and execute projects, namely Operation Gobbler and Operation Santa. Several of our former student interns have ultimately joined the Pasadena Jaycees once they turned 21, and they were able to step in and lead projects almost immediately.

The Jaycees also contribute to other outside volunteer groups, regularly staffing Friends In Deed's Bad Weather Shelter, a weather activated shelter for unhoused individuals, and also volunteering frequently to support foster children in need, the unhoused, and many other members of our community. The Jaycees frequently partner with Five Acres, Friends In Deed, and Union Station.
